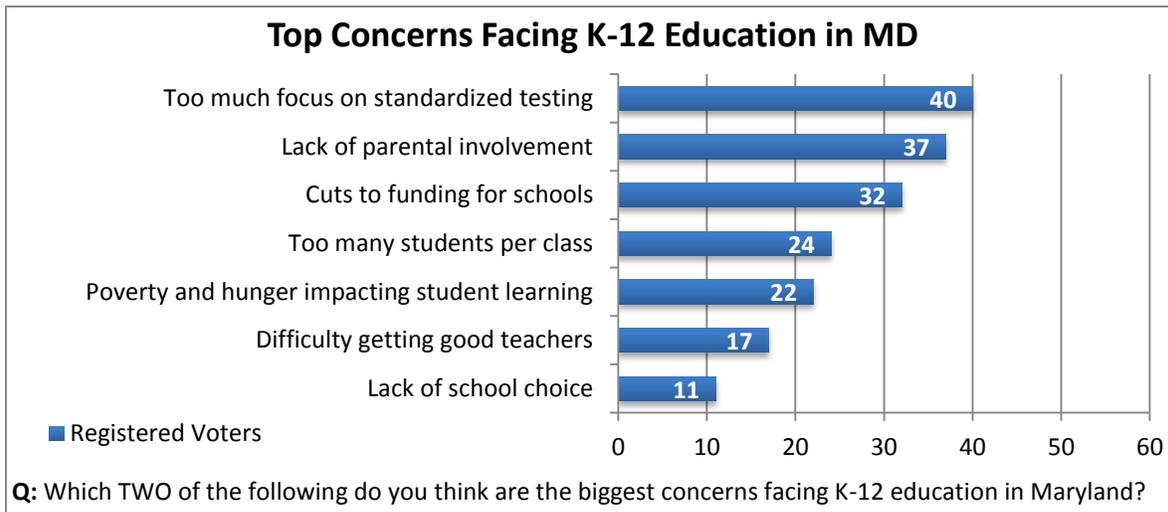
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Survey Analysis: Maryland Voters on Testing

A new survey¹ by GBA Strategies shows that Maryland voters are incredibly concerned about the over-emphasis on standardized testing in Maryland public schools. Voters believe too much time is spent on standardized testing and it is taking away from teaching time. The following are key findings from the survey:

Key Findings from the Survey

- **Concerns about the over-reliance on standardized testing are incredibly high.** It is the number one concern among voters when it comes to K-12 education, followed by concerns about lack of parental involvement and funding cuts. The over-emphasis on standardized testing is either the #1 or #2 concern for Republicans, Independents and Democrats. Lack of school choice is not a top concern for registered voters and placed below each of the other six options.



¹ GBA Strategies administered this survey of 600 Maryland registered voters on behalf of the Maryland State Education Association. This survey was conducted May 12th-17th, 2015 and reached respondents on both landline and cell phones. The survey results carry a margin of error +/-4.0 percentage points at the 95 percent confidence interval. The survey also included an oversample of 300 MSEA members for some questions, which carries a +/-5.7 percentage point margin of error at the 95 percent confidence interval.

- **Nearly two-thirds of voters say too much time is spent on standardized testing.** Not only do parents and voters of all political stripes agree that too much time is spent on standardized testing, but the people who work in K-12 schools overwhelmingly agree (95 percent of MSEA members say too much time is spent on standardized testing).

- **Voters think we should focus on letting teachers teach.** When voters hear arguments on either side of the testing debate, voters across party lines land squarely on the side of reducing standardized testing and letting teachers teach.
